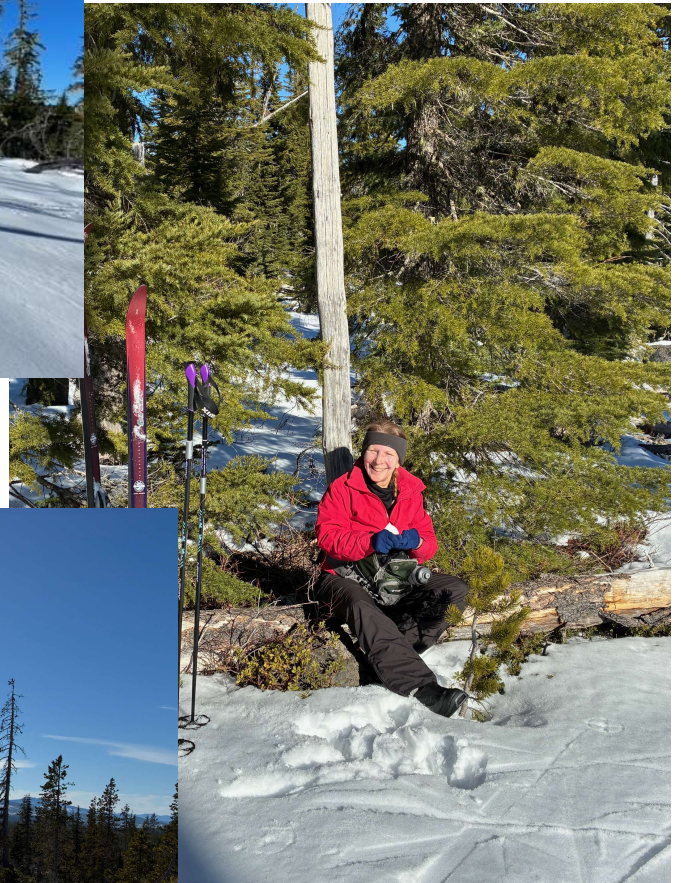
January 18, Sunday: Two Buttes Cutoff

If you didn't ski this weekend, you missed some beautiful weather; and intriguing snow conditions. Leading up to the weekend the Pass had highs in the 60's Tuesday and Wednesday with lows in the 20's Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The surface should have been rock hard ice, right? Wrong! Though the south facing slopes were solid, there was still enough give to the surface for decent grip. North facing slopes and shady areas had light, dry snow where we were sinking 2-4". I could scoop up a hand full of snow in the shade and blow it off my glove like feathers. Go figure.

Bob, Jeanne and I had great skiing, even though the pack was less than 2' deep. The only problem was the marked trails where traffic compaction and melt/freeze had left hard, unpleasant ruts. As a result we spent most of the day rambling off trail. From near the entrance to the North Loop we headed NW, then turned east and crossed both legs of the North Loop. We found an open ridge just south of the South Leg of the North Loop and followed it east to hit Two Buttes Cutoff near its junction with the North Loop. Along the way we found some great hilltop view-points.

Two Buttes was untracked so we turned south and followed it to Claypool Buttes. There was one new tree down across the trail and a couple of tricky water hazards but otherwise a good challenging ski. From there we turned west parallel to the Claypool Buttes trail, skied across the South Loop, turned north and skied parallel to Big Lake Rd. back the SnoPark. The best skiing so far this winter.



January 26, Monday: Lava Lake SnoPark

I did a trip to Lava Lake snopark, but to call it a ski is a stretch—it was mostly walking and carrying the skis. I skied the part of Pumice Loop that we'd worked on: it was clear and well defined and had nearly continuous if rock-hard snow. From the Pumice-Lava View jct, I headed SW on a section of the Lava View trail to it's connection with the 30 Snowmobile route. I walked it west to the gully where the road previously washed out; it's showing some erosion once again. I was actually able to put skis on for a couple of stretches on Rt 30 headed east back to the SnoPark. Again frozen hard, but skiable with skins. Clear, sunny, 26F early, overcast later, mostly calm wind.



January 31, Saturday: Hoodoo's Nordic Tracks

I must say Hoodoo's groomers were doing an exceptional job considering only a 16" base, warm temps, periodic rains and no significant snowfall for three weeks. But it isn't the snow you see in our Ski School poster. While some stretches look decent it's too shallow to set tracks and they are scraping the dirt in places. There isn't enough snow cover to get the groomer across the creek so they are only grooming the south ends of Hoodoo Mdw trail and Hayrick Glade trail and Sheep Springs Loop--about a third of the Lower Trails. Also our melt/freeze cycle creates more problems. The surface softened in the afternoon (50F), but in the morning (35F) it was hard, lumpy and slippery. I had poor grip and wouldn't have wanted a novice to begin on that sort of snow. Still, I skied all the trails 2-3 times and had a certain amount of fun; just needs a bit of fresh on top.



SKI GEAR REPLACEMENT DRIVE:

Generous members of the Willamette and Portland chapters donated skis, poles and bindings to replace equipment burned up in the McKenzie River RD warehouse fire last summer. Abe Quihuis, retired Wilderness Ranger from the Detroit RD also donated a pair of skis; and Next Adventure in Portland donated bindings and a pair of boots while Berg's Ski & Board Shop in Eugene fitted boots, gave us a substantial discount on new boots and shipped the boots to the Ranger Station for free. Thanks to everyone for stepping up and helping make our drive a success. Trails Coordinator, Riley McManus, will be skiing on the new gear at Santiam Pass this weekend.

CROSS-COUNTRY SKI RACING:

Racing is not a primary focus of the Willamette Chapter, but the Winter Olympics begin this weekend with the first cross-country race on Saturday, Feb. 7. Jessie Diggins of Minnesota, current World Cup points leader, will compete in her fourth and final Winter Olympics--hoping to add to her three Olympic medals. On the men's side the US has a respectable team, with Gus Schumacher winning gold in a World Cup race earlier this season. And be sure to watch Johannes Hoesflot Klaebo of Norway--possibly the finest skier of all time. This season he's won gold in the Tour de Ski and is the current World Cup points leader. Last year he won gold in all six events at the 2025 World Championships--something no skier had done before.

Tour Ratings: *A key to the Tour Rating codes:*

"Beginner" = Easy, short distances on flat or gentle slopes; appropriate for first time skiers.

"A" = Easy, distances up to 5 or 6 miles with a few slopes; basic skills are required; some of these may not be suitable for 1 time skiers.

"B" = Intermediate or experienced; distances of 6 to 12 miles or possible elevation gains of 2000 feet; may include steeper sections; some downhill skills are required.

"C" = Advanced, longer with greater elevation gains; includes both trails and off-trail with frequent steep terrain.

"D" = Expert, very difficult or long; possible backcountry travel and/or ski mountaineering.
